For every species, every season and every hunting ground, there is a limit for the numbers of exemplars hunted. TRADE AND PEST SPECIES

Legal trade	Notes
There are game species for which trade is permitted: Mallard, Grey Partridge, Common Pheasant and Common Woodpigeon.	It is regulated by OUG57/2007 which is the law implementing Bird Directive in Romania. The Ministry of Environment is responsible of its implementation
There are game species for which trade is permitted in special conditions (i.e. special authorisation from Ministry of Environment): Greater White-fronted Goose, Greylag Goose, Eurasian Wigeon, Common Teal, Northern Pintail, Norther Shoveler, Common Pochard, Tufted Duck, Greater Scaup, Common Scoter, Western Capercaillie, Common Coot, Eurasian Golden Plover, Jack Snipe, Snipe and Eurasian Woodcock.	Hunting and wildlife trade are regulated by different laws, hence some discrepancies. For example Eurasian Golden Plover is mentioned in the trade law, not in the hunting law.
Legislation on "pest species"	Notes
The legal background for pest species is not coherent or concentrated in a piece of legislation.	For the bird species that affect airports, there are special derogations issued under the EU Birds Directive in order to chase or kill birds. Also, derogations are issued for crows, in cities.
