Hunting	Hunting possible: - only with hunting license, hunting permit in hunting areas, in hunting season, clearly recognise game - geese and ducks can be hunt maximum 1 hour before sunrise and max 1 hour after sunset - hunting possible with falcons	
	Forbidden - poisoning, using chemicals, shooting to the nests, live decoy, hunting from the vehicles, trapping, and all other hunting methods included in the Birds Directive	
Trapping	It is not allowed, or only with special permit for pest control (see below)
